They have used the descriptive survey research design for this work. They found that the technologies have brought unprecedented change and transformation to library resources and services. The authors recommended that libraries organise regular ICT training for effective service delivery.

In the following paper “**Role of Public Libraries for the Preservation of Mizo Indigenous Knowledge in the Digital Era**” the authors *Esther Lalruatpuii* and *Ngurtinkhuma* studied the role of public libraries in keeping Mizo Indigenous Knowledge within the context of the digital era.
