We release the second issue of the fifteenth volume of the **International Journal of Information Studies** with the below-described papers.

In the opening paper on “**A Framework for the Study of Library System and Services in Dhar District of Madhya Pradesh**” the authors *Bharat Singh Chouhan, Vinay Gorey, and Suresh Babu* introduced a prototype design for rural library services in the central region of India and makes it scalable to accommodate the designs for the modern rural village libraries in India. The data for the design is developed using several different impact studies, including one research study of several global regions. The studied region is Dhar, located in the Central part of India and this work has the potential to get applied to other regions.

In the next paper on “**Perception and Attitude of Postgraduate Students of Library and Information Science Towards Scholarly Publications in Nigeria**” the authors *Kehinde Owolabi, Nurudeen Aderibigbe, Aderonke Adeshina, Nduka Nworu and Margaret Owunezi* studied the perception and attitude of postgraduate (PG) students of Library and Information Science (LIS) towards scholarly publications in Nigeria. They recommended a need for university management through postgraduate schools to create enabling environments that will promote research and innovation in Nigerian universities. The research will be the reference point for researchers working on postgraduate and scholarly publications in developing countries.

In the last paper “**A Study of the GNU General Public Licence-based Patients Information Management System to Manage Healthcare Systems**” the authors *Manashree Chakraborty, Kanu Chakraborty and Navin Upadhyay* explored and reviewed the list of GNU GPL software in the healthcare domain and their comparative analysis. his study found that OPenEMR is the best software, followed by GNUmed, OneTouchEMR and Nosh.
